ENGAGEMENT PROCESS

PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT ACTIVITIES

The purpose of the Public Participation Plan was to provide a roadmap to systematically achieve goals and objectives for participation, ensuring diverse and inclusive public input during the development of the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan for the Gainesville Metropolitan Area. The Public Participation Plan includes goals, targeted objectives, a variety of strategies and tools, and tactics to ensure effectiveness. The Public Participation Plan, as amended is included in the Appendix. As required by federal law, the plan was available for a 45-day review and comment period before it was approved and amended.

Pre-COVID-19 Pandemic

Initially, the public involvement process for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan was guided by a Public Participation Plan. The Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Public Participation Plan was consistent with the Public Involvement Plan. During this period, the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Vision Statement, Principles and Strategies were approved by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area.

COVID-19 Pandemic

In March 2020, the impacts of the COVID-19 Pandemic disrupted normal transportation planning and public participation activities beyond mitigations in the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization Continuity of Operations Plan. In accordance with the State of Florida Office of the Governor Emergency Order Number 20-69, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area approved continuity of operations resolutions for emergency administrative authority, public involvement and virtual meetings via communications meeting technology. By subsequent Executive Orders, the State of Florida Office of the Governor Emergency Order Number 20-69 was extended to cover the balance of the time period for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan update process.

Due to the effects of COVID-19 Pandemic and state and local mandates to avoid in-person meetings and large gatherings for public health and safety reasons, public workshops and committee meetings were changed to virtual web-based meetings and/or telephone conference call platforms. Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area meetings and public hearings were conducted on a web-based platform and broadcasted on Cox Cable Channel 12. Closure-of and limited-access to public buildings impacted distribution of flyers and public notices.

In addition to the amendment of the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Public Participation Plan to mitigate for COVID-19 Pandemic impacts, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization also revised its Continuity of Operations Plan and Public Involvement Plan to provide mitigation for disruptions of operations and public participation as severe as has occurred from the COVID-19 Pandemic.

PROJECT WEBSITE

Information about the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan process was posted on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area website www.ncfrpc.org/mtpo/LRTP.html. The website contained general information about the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan planning process and upcoming meetings, as well as contact information for project staff. The website was updated throughout the process and provided interested parties with project information, links to surveys, and opportunities to provide comments and to sign up to receive communications and announcements about the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan. A calendar identifying all project-related public meetings and activities was posted on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area website.

SURVEYS

Surveys were another tool used for collecting public comments on the Year 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan. An online survey was available on the website https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/Gainesville2045LRTP. The online survey gave the public an opportunity to be involved during the planning process. The online survey results are included in the Appendix. The Survey was distributed via a link to local stakeholder groups, advisory committees and the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area's email distribution list, and announced multiple times at all three public workshops, as well as both during the adoption process for the Needs Plan.

Due to public gathering limitations during the COVID-19 Pandemic, the workshops were conducted virtually via communications media technology.

MEETINGS/PRESENTATIONS

Staff from the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and consultant staff made presentations at virtual public workshops for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan process. The workshops were held on the dates listed below:

- Workshop #1, May 12, 2020;
- Workshop #2, June 9, 2020; and
- Workshop #3, July 7, 2020.

COMMITTEE MEETINGS

Briefings were also provided to the Technical Advisory Committee, Citizens Advisory Committee, and Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Board of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area throughout the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan process. The meeting minutes are included in the Appendix. Due to public gathering

limitations during the COVID-19 Pandemic, the committee meetings were held virtually via communications media technology.

PRESENTATIONS

Briefings were provided to the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area at key points during the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan process, including at the public hearings: June 22, 2020 (Needs Plan public hearing) and August 24, 2020 (Cost Feasible Plan public hearing). Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area public meetings included a time for public comment, serving as an additional opportunity for the public to share their comments on the transportation needs and priorities. Minutes for the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area meetings are available on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area website www.ncfrpc.org/mtpo and in the Appendix.

EVALUATION

The various methods used to engage the public in the development of the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan provided a wide range of feedback throughout the process. The combination of workshops and advisory committee meetings allowed participants to focus on their priorities and needs for the transportation network in the Gainesville Urbanized Area. Held at various points in the process, these activities provided important feedback on the plan recommendations, shaping the final Needs and Cost Feasible Plans. A summary of the Community Public Workshops is included below:

COMMUNITY PUBLIC WORKSHOP 1

The first scheduled community public workshop for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan was held on May 12, 2020 virtually via a web-based platform, in compliance with state mandated social distancing orders related to COVID-19. The workshop was hosted by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area.

This workshop was the first of a series of three community public workshops and two public hearings conducted during the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan update. The workshop was designed to allow participants to provide input to help identify transportation issues and needs. Public involvement is very important to this planning process, as the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan sets transportation priorities and guides the federal, state, and local funding for transportation projects over the next 25 years.

Workshop Attendance

Twenty persons participated in the workshop, of which eight persons were from the City of Gainesville and Alachua County. Also attending were six members of the project team from the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and

project consultant firm. The other 11 persons were from various agencies, including the Florida Department of Transportation, Alachua County, and the City of Gainesville. Both e-mail and newspaper advertisement notices were provided to encourage stakeholders to attend the workshop. Project representatives were available to discuss the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan, receive public input, and answer questions.

Public Notification

Workshop invitations were sent to stakeholders by e-mail. In accordance with the Public Participation Plan COVID-19 Pandemic Addendum, public notices were placed on the front door of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area office and on the Alachua County Administration Building exterior bulletin board. The invitations and public notices included the date, time, web address and call-in information for the virtual Community Public Workshop #1. Workshop notification and materials were placed on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Urbanized Area Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan webpage.

Media Notification

The workshop was advertised in advance with display advertisements in The Independent Florida Alligator, Gainesville Guardian, and The Gainesville Sun and digital advertisements on their respective websites. A press release was distributed to major local media outlets.

Workshop Agenda

The workshop agenda included a 45-minute slide presentation which gave an overview of 2045 growth projections, an overview of the long-range transportation plan process, major topics, including the goals, objectives, and policies and the requirements of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act and the project schedule. This was followed by a question and answer session and discussion of plan needs by members of the public in attendance.

Workshop Handouts

The slides from the presentation for the workshop were posted on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area webpage. Participants were encouraged to view and share with their friends, family, and neighbors the presentation and discuss their thoughts and concerns regarding the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan with project team members. Additionally, they were also encouraged to share the contact information for the project team members as well as the online survey link.

Public Comments

There was one e-mail received from the public prior to the workshop, which was read to the workshop attendees as part of the discussion and questions session. Public discussion centered on the process and what to expect in subsequent workshops. Participants were encouraged to share their opinions and questions through e-mail to Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area staff or via the online survey, and to freely distribute the online survey link.

COMMUNITY PUBLIC WORKSHOP 2

The second workshop for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan was held on June 9, 2020 virtually via a web-based platform, in compliance with state mandated social distancing orders related to COVID-19. The workshop was hosted by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area.

This workshop was the second of a series of three workshops and two public hearings conducted during the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan update. The workshop was designed to present the results of the Gainesville Urbanized Area Transportation Study travel demand model testing and evaluation and receive input regarding two future (Year 2045) transportation networks: Alternative 1 - allocates future revenues primarily to new corridors and Alternative 2 - allocates future revenues primarily to existing corridors. Public involvement is very important to this planning process, as the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan sets local transportation priorities and guides the federal, state, and local funding for transportation projects over the next 25 years.

Workshop Attendance

Twenty-five persons participated in the workshop, of which 16 persons were from the City Gainesville and Alachua County. Also attending were five members of the project team from the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and project consultant firm. The other four persons were from various agencies, including the Florida Department of Transportation, Alachua County, and the City of Gainesville. Both e-mail and newspaper advertisement notices were provided to encourage stakeholders to attend the workshop. Project representatives were available to discuss the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan, receive public input, and answer questions.

Public Notification

Workshop invitations were sent to stakeholders by e-mail. In accordance with the Public Participation Plan COVID-19 Pandemic Addendum, public notices were placed on the front door of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area office and on the Alachua County Administration Building exterior bulletin board. The invitations and public notices included the date, time, web address and call-in information for the virtual Community Public Workshop #2. Workshop notification and materials were placed on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Urbanized Area Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan webpage.

Media Notification

The workshop was advertised in advance with display advertisements in The Independent Florida Alligator, Gainesville Guardian, and The Gainesville Sun and digital advertisements on their respective websites. In addition, flyers were placed on the City of Gainesville Regional Transit System buses. A press release was distributed to major local media outlets.

Workshop Agenda

The workshop agenda included a slide presentation that gave an overview of Year 2045 Needs Plan Development, Forecasted Year 2045 Growth, Potential Needs Plan Projects, and the project schedule. An online survey was deployed during the beginning of the presentation, with a request for the attendees to complete for the discussion phase. The workshop specific survey asked the attendees to mark their top three projects and was discussed in realtime during the workshop at the designated time noted to the attendees at the beginning of the presentation. The results of the survey are provided in the Appendix. In addition to the survey, a question and answer period also allowed attendees to ask questions and discuss their ideas and concerns with members of the project team.

Public Comments

Public comments included notes from a former city commissioner for the City of Archer and comments from a current city commissioner for the City of Archer regarding the importance of adding two lanes to State Road 24 (Archer Road) from SW 75th Street to the City of Archer. Other comments included clarifying that bicycle and pedestrian projects will be considered. The Needs Plan projects were reviewed, and some participants utilized the survey to provide a ranking preference for their top three projects.

COMMUNITY PUBLIC WORKSHOP 3

The third community public workshop for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan was held on July 7, 2020 virtually via a web-based platform, in compliance with state mandated social distancing orders related to COVID-19. The workshop was hosted by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area.

This workshop was the third of a series of three workshops and two public hearings conducted during the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan update. The workshop was designed to present the adopted Year 2045 Needs Plan and estimated revenue forecasts for State Highway System, Federal Transportation Alternatives Program and Federal Surface Transportation Program projects. The adopted Year 2045 Needs Plan includes: Roadway projects (including Strategic Intermodal System projects), Transit projects, Bicycle and Pedestrian projects, and Aspirational projects (beyond 2045). This workshop was an opportunity to receive public input regarding projects to be funded in the Cost Feasible Plan that was subsequently adopted on August 24, 2020. Public involvement is very important to this planning process, as the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan sets local transportation priorities and guides the federal, state, and local funding for transportation projects over the next 25 years.

Workshop Attendance

Twenty-three persons participated in the workshop, of which 12 persons were from the City of Gainesville and Alachua County. Also attending were five members of the project team from the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and project consultant firm. The other six persons were from various agencies, including the Florida Department of Transportation, Alachua County, and the City of Gainesville. Both e-mail and newspaper advertisement notices were provided to encourage stakeholders to attend the

workshop. Project representatives were available to discuss the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan, receive public input, and answer questions.

Public Notification

Workshop invitations were sent to stakeholders by e-mail. In accordance with the Public Participation Plan COVID-19 Pandemic Addendum, public notices were placed on the front door of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization office for the Gainesville Urbanized Area and on the Alachua County Administration Building exterior bulletin board. The invitations and public notices included the date, time, web address and call-in information for the virtual Community Public Workshop #3. Workshop notification and materials were placed on the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Urbanized Area Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan webpage.

Media Notification

The workshop was advertised in advance with display advertisements in The Independent Florida Alligator, Gainesville Guardian, and The Gainesville Sun and digital advertisements on their respective websites. In addition, flyers were placed on the City of Gainesville Regional Transit System buses. A press release was distributed to major local media outlets prior to the meeting.

Workshop Agenda

The workshop agenda included a slide presentation.

Public Comments

Nine comment forms were received at the workshop.

Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Survey

An online survey was available from May 6, 2020 to August 24, 2020, and was announced to the public at workshops and public hearings to encourage feedback from the general public. Seven comments were received; however, one comment was a duplicate. Comments provided are included in the Appendix, and included multiple comments concerning the need to add two lanes to State Road 24 (Archer Road) from SW 75th Street (Tower Road) to the City of Archer and on other specific roadways with congestion and commuter traffic considerations, as well as transit, and bicycle and pedestrian infrastructure. These comments, along with the public comments, were used for project evaluation and prioritization criteria.

Environmental Justice (Low-Income, Minority, and Special Population Groups Outreach)

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (42 United States Code 2000d-1) provides that no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance. Title VI provides the following protection and activities relative to public involvement:

- Encourages the participation of minorities as members of planning or advisory bodies for programs receiving Federal funds;
- Requires information and services to be provided in languages other than English when significant numbers of potential beneficiaries have limited English-speaking ability; and
- Requires entities to notify the entire eligible population about programs.

This Long-Range Transportation Plan update included outreach to the elderly, persons with disabilities, minorities and low-income community, environmental justice populations such as transportation disadvantaged, transit-dependent, and other groups traditionally underrepresented in the plan update process. To ensure outreach to low-income, minority, elderly, and other special populations, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization, consistent with the Public Participation Plan COVID-19 Pandemic Addendum, ensured that the following groups were contacted throughout the process (Table 1). These groups were contacted by email with invitations for all three workshops, and notice was provided concerning the adoption public hearings for distribution to their listservs.



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Technical Analysis

As part of the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan - Needs Plan roadway project list development, the following technical analysis was conducted using the updated Gainesville/Alachua County Model.

- The adopted Existing Plus Committed projects list was obtained from the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization.
- Existing Plus Committed projects were coded using the updated model 2015 base year network.
- 2045 socio-economic data was developed using 2040 approved data and five-year growth was added to match the University of Florida, Bureau of Economic and Business Research population estimate.
- University of Florida estimates of student enrollments, university employment, parking spaces and classroom seats were obtained from University of Florida staff.

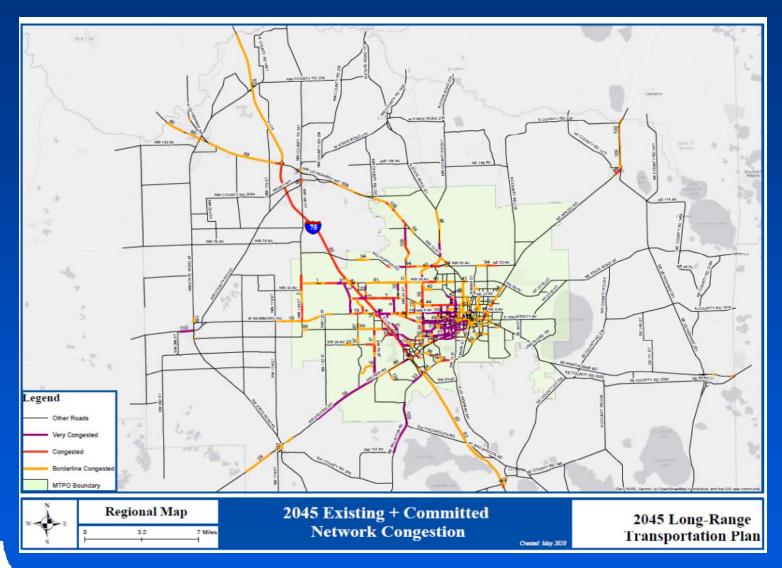

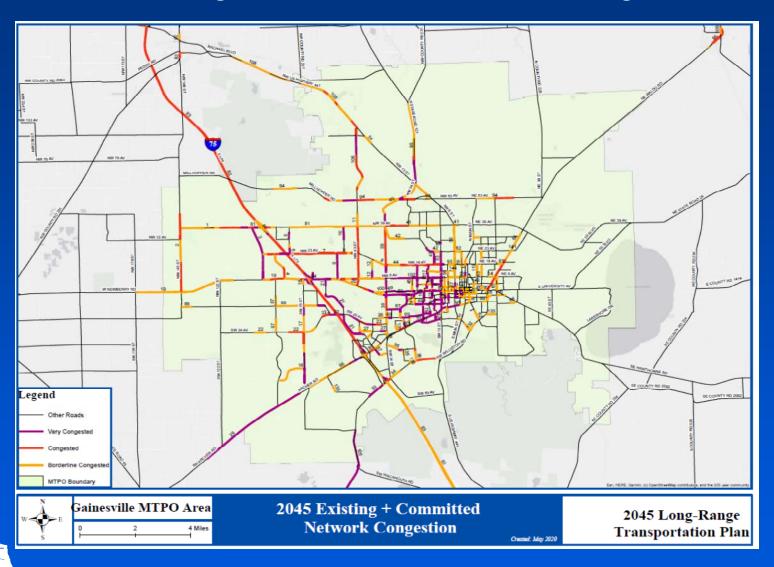


2045 Existing + Committed Network Congestion






2045 Existing + Committed Network Congestion

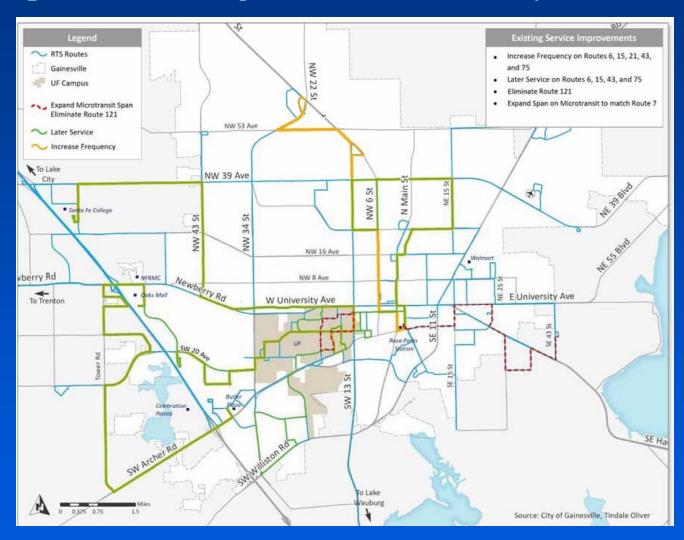




Draft Year 2045 Needs Plan Transit Projects -Regional Transit System Transit Development Plan



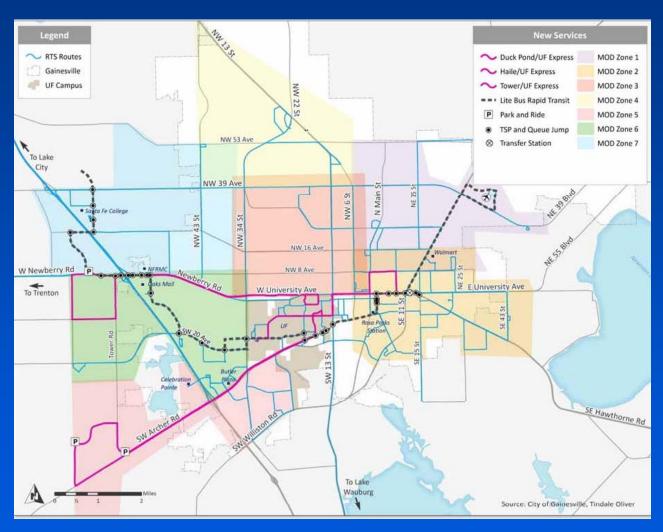



Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Technical Analysis

As part of the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan - Needs Plan roadway project list development, the following technical analysis was conducted using the updated Gainesville/Alachua County Model.

- Adopted Existing Plus Committed projects list was obtained from the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization staff.
- Existing Plus Committed projects were coded using the updated model 2015 base year network.
- 2045 socio-economic data was developed using 2040 approved data and five years of growth was added to match the University of Florida, Bureau of Economic and Business Research population estimate.
- University of Florida estimates of student enrollments, university employment, parking spaces and classroom seats were obtained from University of Florida staff.






2045 Existing + Committed Network Congestion






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


2045 Existing + Committed Network Congestion

What does "Cost Feasible Plan" mean?

- What we can afford: Project implementation is fiscally constrained by how much money is available
- Fiscal considerations for the Long-Range Transportation Plan are based on Florida Department of Transportation long-range revenue forecasts
- Plan considers evaluation criteria for project ranking and combines this with an understanding of fiscal constraint



2045 Revenue Forecast

- Revenue Forecast as provided by Florida Department of Transportation resulted from three step process:
 - State and Federal Revenue from current sources estimated
 - Revenues distributed among appropriate statewide capacity and non-capacity programs
 - County level estimates (Other Roads and Transit Programs) developed, along with other estimates of interest for Metropolitan Planning Organizations.

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
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Relationship between Volume-to-Capacity Ratios and Congestion Levels




2045 Existing + Committed Network Congestion







Principle 3: Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and freight

Principle 5: Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight

Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Needs Plan Project Ranking Evaluation Criteria

Ten distinct evaluation criteria were developed:

- 1. Partial funding of a Year 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan and/or List of Priority Projects project or project funding commitment in Transportation Improvement Program, or Local Plan Priority;
- 2. Project increases accessibility to economic hubs;
- 3. Project reduces vehicle trips on major corridors;
- 4. Congestion reduction on the regional system/Enhances Time Reliability;
- 5. Project shifts mode from auto to other;
- 6. Project does not adversely affect the environment;
- 7. Project expands network connectivity;
- 8. Project promotes eliminating fatalities and reducing serious injuries on all public roads;
- 9. Project maintains Systemic State of Good Repair; and
- 10. Public Input.

These are consistent with the requirements of the Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act.



Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Needs Plan Project Ranking Evaluation Criteria

Nine of the criteria were utilized with this point system.

- One point equated to a criterion not addressing a Principle well.
- Three points equated to a criterion addressing a Principle moderately well.
- Five points equated to a criterion addressing a Principle very well.

An average weighted score was calculated for each of the evaluation criteria.

For the 10th criteria, public input, a maximum of 3 points was provided. This was derived from Workshop #3 public input and a review of the public comments received to date on the SurveyMonkey link noted in prior public workshops and the presentation to the Board in June 2020.

Each Needs Plan project was evaluated using this objective set of criteria before funding considerations, as required.

Maximum score attainable for each project is 32.8.



What does "Cost Feasible Plan" mean?

- What we can afford: Project implementation is fiscally constrained by how much money is available
- Fiscal considerations for the Long-Range Transportation Plan are based on Florida Department of Transportation long-range revenue forecasts
- Plan considers evaluation criteria for project ranking and combines this with an understanding of fiscal constraint



2045 Revenue Forecast

- Revenue Forecast as provided by Florida Department of Transportation resulted from three step process:
 - State and Federal Revenue from current sources estimated
 - Revenues distributed among appropriate statewide capacity and non-capacity programs

Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Update Draft Vision Statement, Principles and Strategies

As with previous Long-Range Transportation Plans, the vision statement and the supporting principles and strategies serve as the cornerstone and building blocks of the Year 2045 Needs and Cost Feasible Plans. The vision statement, principles and strategies are the policy statements of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area to provide the framework for the development of the plan update. The Vision Statement for this plan update reads as follows:

A transportation system that is safe and efficient, serves the mobility needs of people and freight, and fosters economic prosperity while minimizing transportation-related fuel consumption and air pollution.

This vision is supported by the following Principles and Strategies:

Principle 1: Support economic vitality

- Strategy 1.1: Support transportation projects that promote economic development and tourism.
- Strategy 1.2: Consider capacity enhancement projects that allow for the expansion of existing commercial centers.
- Strategy 1.3: Support projects that improve connectivity to existing or planned economic centers.

Principle 2: Increase safety and security for motorized and non-motorized users

- Strategy 2.1: Support projects that address safety performance targets and increase safety for all users.
- Strategy 2.2: Implement techniques and road design to reduce fatalities and serious injuries.
- Strategy 2.3: Support projects that increase safety and security for all users of the non-motorized transportation system.
- Strategy 2.4: Encourage development of alternative fuel sources and multimodal infrastructure to provide continuing transportation services.
- Strategy 2.5: Coordinate with appropriate agencies to accommodate incident management and emergency management.

Principle 3: Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and freight

- Strategy 3.1: Improve the level of service for roads using transportation system management strategies (such as computerized traffic signal systems, motorist information systems and incident management systems) and transportation demand management strategies (such as carpools, transit, bicycling, walking, telecommuting and flexible work schedules).
- Strategy 3.2: Encourage the construction of bus bays (turnouts) where possible.
- Strategy 3.3: Preserve the intended function of roads on the Florida Strategic Intermodal System for intercity travel and freight movement.
- Strategy 3.4: Expand mobility options, including transit, to improve accessibility, availability and competitiveness of transit as a viable travel option.
- Strategy 3.5: Support projects that will improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system.
- Strategy 3.6: Support innovative technologies projects that will enhance the efficiency of the transportation system, such as automated and connected vehicles, shared-use vehicles and alternative-fueled vehicles.
- Principle 4: Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns
- Strategy 4.1: Support land use designations and encourage development plans that reduce vehicle miles traveled and are transit-supportive.
- Strategy 4.2: Develop and expand a network that provides for safe and convenient opportunities for bicyclists and pedestrians.
- Strategy 4.3: Reduce adverse impacts of transportation on the environment, including habitat and ecosystem fragmentation, wildlife collisions and non-point source pollution.
- Strategy 4.4: Coordinate transportation and future land use decisions to promote efficient development patterns and a choice of transportation modes, consistent with local comprehensive plans.
- Strategy 4.5: Support projects that will reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.

Principle 5: Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight

- Strategy 5.1: Develop mobility hubs and freight intermodal centers at appropriate locations.
- Strategy 5.2: Provide adequate sidewalks to all bus stops and bicycle racks on all buses.

Principle 6: Promote efficient system management and operation

- Strategy 6.1: Develop a transportation system that disperses traffic throughout the local transportation grid rather than concentrating traffic on a few major roads.

Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan Update Draft Vision Statement, Principles and Strategies

As with previous Long-Range Transportation Plans, the vision statement and the supporting principles and strategies serve as the cornerstone and building blocks of the Year 2045 Needs and Cost Feasible Plans. The vision statement, principles and strategies are the policy statements of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area to provide the framework for the development of the plan update. The Vision Statement for this plan update reads as follows:

A transportation system that is safe and efficient, serves the mobility needs of people and freight, and fosters economic prosperity while minimizing transportation-related fuel consumption and air pollution.

This vision is supported by the following Principles and Strategies:

Principle 1: Support economic vitality

- Strategy 1.1: Support transportation projects that promote economic development and tourism.
- Strategy 1.2: Consider capacity enhancement projects that allow for the expansion of existing commercial centers.
- Strategy 1.3: Support projects that improve connectivity to existing or planned economic centers.

Principle 2: Increase safety and security for motorized and non-motorized users

- Strategy 2.1: Support projects that address safety performance targets and increase safety for all users.
- Strategy 2.2: Implement techniques and road design to reduce fatalities and serious injuries.
- Strategy 2.3: Support projects that increase safety and security for all users of the non-motorized transportation system.
- Strategy 2.4: Encourage development of alternative fuel sources and multimodal infrastructure to provide continuing transportation services.
- Strategy 2.5: Coordinate with appropriate agencies to accommodate incident management and emergency management.

Principle 3: Increase the accessibility and mobility of people and freight

- Strategy 3.1: Improve the level of service for roads using transportation system management strategies (such as computerized traffic signal systems, motorist information systems and incident management systems) and transportation demand management strategies (such as carpools, transit, bicycling, walking, telecommuting and flexible work schedules).
- Strategy 3.2: Encourage the construction of bus bays (turnouts) where possible.
- Strategy 3.3: Preserve the intended function of roads on the Florida Strategic Intermodal System for intercity travel and freight movement.
- Strategy 3.4: Expand mobility options, including transit, to improve accessibility, availability and competitiveness of transit as a viable travel option.
- Strategy 3.5: Support projects that will improve the resiliency and reliability of the transportation system.
- Strategy 3.6: Support innovative technologies projects that will enhance the efficiency of the transportation system, such as automated and connected vehicles, shared-use vehicles and alternative-fueled vehicles.
- Principle 4: Protect and enhance the environment, promote energy conservation, improve the quality of life and promote consistency between transportation improvements and State and local planned growth and economic development patterns
- Strategy 4.1: Support land use designations and encourage development plans that reduce vehicle miles traveled and are transit-supportive.
- Strategy 4.2: Develop and expand a network that provides for safe and convenient opportunities for bicyclists and pedestrians.
- Strategy 4.3: Reduce adverse impacts of transportation on the environment, including habitat and ecosystem fragmentation, wildlife collisions and non-point source pollution.
- Strategy 4.4: Coordinate transportation and future land use decisions to promote efficient development patterns and a choice of transportation modes, consistent with local comprehensive plans.
- Strategy 4.5: Support projects that will reduce or mitigate stormwater impacts of surface transportation.

Principle 5: Enhance the integration and connectivity of the transportation system, across and between modes, for people and freight

- Strategy 5.1: Develop mobility hubs and freight intermodal centers at appropriate locations.
- Strategy 5.2: Provide adequate sidewalks to all bus stops and bicycle racks on all buses.

Principle 6: Promote efficient system management and operation

- Strategy 6.1: Develop a transportation system that disperses traffic throughout the local transportation grid rather than concentrating traffic on a few major roads.
- Strategy 6.2: Encourage the development and location of employment and service centers that reduce travel distances from residential areas and to transit services.
- Strategy 6.3: Continue to implement a coordinated traffic signal system plan to improve road efficiency and to maintain traffic flow.

Principle 7: Emphasize the preservation of the existing transportation system

- Strategy 7.1: Direct sufficient resources to preserve existing transportation infrastructure.
- Strategy 7.2: Protect existing and future road rights-of-way from development encroachment.
- Strategy 7.3: Support projects that address bridge, pavement and system performance targets on the National Highway System.
- Strategy 7.4: Support projects that address transit asset management (state-of-good repair) targets.

V. INTELLIGENT TRANSPORTATION SYSTEM AND TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM

Mr. Koons stated that the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization requested an update concerning the intelligent transportation system and transportation management system. He said that City of Gainesville staff was present to discuss this agenda item.

Emanuel Posadas, Gainesville Traffic Operations Manager, discussed the history and modernization of the intelligent transportation system and transportation management system, including the conversion of pavement-embedded magnetic metal loop detectors to use of overhead real-time traffic video cameras for signal detection, and answered questions.

A member discussed privacy concerns regarding the use of the traffic video cameras.

Mr. Posadas stated that traffic video cameras operate in real time and is not recorded. He noted privacy policies and the use of the traffic video cameras by law enforcement.

A member stated that the traffic video camera technology is intended for public safety and was supportive of a policy discussion to address privacy concerns.

A member asked about law enforcement access to the traffic video cameras.

Mr. Posadas stated that a raw live feed is provided to law enforcement by request. He noted that law enforcement has used the traffic video cameras for football games and other traffic incident management events.

A member recommended a tour of the Traffic Management Center to observe the use of the traffic video cameras.

Malisa McCreedy, Gainesville Mobility Department Director, stated that a one-page summary of the traffic video camera policies would be provided to the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization. She noted that the traffic video cameras assist in rerouting transit around traffic incidents.

Mr. Posadas discussed and answered questions on future technology for the traffic management system and also presented an overview of the traffic signalization and traffic management center staffs.

A member discussed traffic safety concerns in some subdivisions.

Mr. Posadas stated that the Federal Highway Administration has videos to demonstrate coordinated traffic signalization. He said he would be provided them to the Gainesville Mobility Director to forward to the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization.

Kristen Young, representing Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation, discussed the efficiency of the traffic management system for motorist travelling at the speed limit and concerns for single occupant vehicles and for the safety and mobility of bicyclists and pedestrians.

Mr. Posadas discussed traffic progression for the predominant direction of traffic.

Mr. Koons stated that traffic safety concerns could be referred to the Alachua County Traffic Safety Team.

A member discussed pedestrian scramble signal phase at the U.S. 441 and State Road 26 (West University Avenue) intersection.

Mr. Posadas discussed pedestrian-only signal phasing and leading-pedestrian signal phasing and answered questions.

Mr. Koons stated that the Technical Advisory Committee will address pedestrian-only signal phasing.

CA. 8 STATE ROAD 26 (WEST NEWBERRY ROAD) BIKELANES UPDATE - FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION RESPONSE

Chair Cornell stated that the Florida Department of Transportation has provided a response concerning the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization request to restripe a portion of State Road 26 (West Newberry Road) for instreet bikelanes. He discussed the response and answered questions.

A member stated concerns for accommodating private parking for a few businesses at the public expense.

Mari Schwabacher, Florida Department of Transportation Planning Specialist IV, discussed the Florida Department of Transportation response letter. She stated that the recommendation is in response to those who participated in the public meeting. She noted that the proposed alignment retains the parking and provides bikelanes.

Ms. Young, representing Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation spoke in support of the restriping.

Chris Dawson, Alachua County Senior Transportation Planner, discussed the County's pressure-washing technique to restripe NW 16th Boulevard and the Florida Department of Transportation requirement to mill and resurface for restriping State Road 26 (West Newberry Road). He noted that the Florida Department of Transportation required technique to restripe is more expensive.

MOTION: Mayor Poe moved to authorize the Chair to sign a letter to the Florida Department of Transportation to reiterate its request to restripe State Road 26 (West Newberry Road) for protected instreet bikelanes. Commissioner Simmons seconded; motion passed unanimously.

Chair Cornell announced that the next Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization meeting is scheduled for April 22, 2019 at 3:00 p.m.

A member discussed pedestrian and motorist safety at the SW 6th Street roundabouts concerning yielding to pedestrians.

MOTION: Commissioner Byerly moved to refer to staff to provide roundabout safety-related recommendations to inform the public and users of roundabouts, including but not limited to signage and education. Commissioner Arreola seconded; motion passed unanimously.

B. CITIZENS

Ms. Young stated that the Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation supports fare-free transit on the Regional Transit System for elementary, middle and high schools students. She stated that Hillsborough Leon and Polk Counties provide fare-free programs. She noted that students need access to afterschool programs.

Dan Hoffman, Gainesville Assistant City Manager, reported that the City is researching fare-free transit as part of its Transit Development Plan update and first-mile/last-mile access to transit.

A member announced that a City of Gainesville City Commission workshop concerning fare-free transit is scheduled for the evening of April 24, 2019.

C. CHAIR'S REPORT

Chair Cornell stated Interstate 75 was discussed with the staff of Congressman Ted Yoho and at a joint Alachua County-Marion County Board of County Commissioners meeting. He also noted the Suncoast Parkway extension to Georgia proposal made by the Florida Senate President Bill Galvano. He stated the position of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization to support projects to enhance the safety and efficiency of Interstate 75 over the development of the Coastal Connector.

It was a consensus of the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization to authorize the Chair to send a letter to the Florida Department of Transportation to reiterate its position to support projects to enhance the safety and efficiency of Interstate 75 that are consistent with the Alachua County and City of Gainesville comprehensive plans and the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization Year 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan.

Karen Taulbee, Florida Department of Transportation Urban Planning Manager, discussed the U.S. Highway 441 resurfacing project and answered questions. She also stated that she could provide information on the type of guardrails to be installed on U.S. Highway 441.

Kristen Young, representing Gainesville Citizens for Active Transportation, suggested partnering with the University of Florida. She also discussed the Florida Trail Towns Program.

MOTION: Mayor Poe moved to refer scoping and funding mechanisms to update the Alachua Countywide Bicycle Master Plan to its advisory committees. Commissioner Hutchinson seconded; motion passed unanimously.

MOTION: Commissioner Simmons moved to have staff schedule a Florida Trail Towns Program presentation and invite the outlying municipalities in Alachua County to the presentation. Commissioner Arreola seconded; motion passed unanimously.

CA. 9 EXCLUSIVE PEDESTRIAN PHASE AT STATE ROAD 26 (UNIVERSITY AVENUE) AT U.S. HIGHWAY 441 (WEST 13TH STREET) - CITY OF GAINESVILLE EMAIL

Mr. Koons stated that the City of Gainesville staff provided a pedestrian scramble phase evaluation at the State Road 26 (University Avenue) at U.S. Highway 441 (West 13th Street) intersection.

Ms. Taulbee stated that pedestrian counts need updating. She said that counts are currently being collected.

Malisa McCreedy, Gainesville Mobility Department Director, suggested a study evaluating the elimination of turns at this intersection in order to prioritize pedestrian safety and mobility over vehicles.

A member suggested testing the pedestrian scramble.

Ms. Young noted the use of the roadway grid to avoid congested intersections.

Fletcher Hope, City of Archer City Commissioner, noted the efficiency of pedestrian tunnels and bridges.

MOTION: Commissioner Ward moved to refer to the City of Gainesville Mobility Department coordination with the Florida Department of Transportation to develop and conduct a pedestrian scramble trial study for the State Road 26 (University Avenue) at U.S. Highway 441 (West 13th Street) intersection. Ms. Taulbee stated that the Florida Department of Transportation Maintenance Office is responsible for roadway maintenance contracts.

By consensus, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization requested that the Florida Department of Transportation provide the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization with information concerning state roadway maintenance contracts.

Several members discussed concerns about paratransit service provided by MV Transportation, Inc.

- Bicycle/Pedestrian Alachua Countywide Bicycle-Pedestrian Master Plan, State Road 26 (Newberry Road) Sidewalk and SW 20 Avenue Sidewalk;
- Intersection Main Street at State Road 331 (Williston Road) Safety Project and State Road 121 (NW 34 Street) Turnlanes NW 16 Avenue to U.S. Highway 441;
- Interstate Managed Lane Study Gainesville Metropolitan Area;
- Maintenance Lighting Agreement Countywide;




What is the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area?

The Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area is responsible for the continuing, comprehensive, and cooperative urban transportation planning program for the Gainesville Metropolitan Area. The Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization serves as the designated metropolitan planning organization for the Gainesville Metropolitan Area. Metropolitan planning organizations are government organizations mandated by the Federal Highway Act of 1973, to provide a cooperative, comprehensive, and continuing transportation planning and decision-making process. Metropolitan planning organizations act as liaisons among local governments, communities, residents, and state and federal Departments of Transportation. Metropolitan planning organizations currently operate under the federal Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act and Chapter 339.175, Florida Statutes. The Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization is comprised of the five Alachua County Commissioners, the Mayor and six City of Gainesville Commissioners as voting members. Representatives of the University of Florida, the Florida Department of Transportation and a Rural Advisor serve as non-voting members.

What is a Long Range Transportation Plan?

The Long-Range Transportation Plan is a federal requirement to address future transportation needs within the Gainesville Urbanized Area for a minimum of 20 years. Currently, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization plans for 25-year horizon. The purpose is to plan a transportation system that safely and effectively connects communities, airport and port facilities within the Gainesville Metropolitan Area to other regions, other states, and the global economy. The Long-Range Transportation Plan is updated every five years to ensure consistency with new developments, trends and objectives, and to encourage and promote a safe and efficient transportation system to serve future year transportation demands.

The 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan covers the Gainesville Metropolitan Area located in the center of Alachua County, Florida, and includes the entire the City of Gainesville and a portion of the City of Alachua, as well as the surrounding urban and transitioning areas. Gainesville is inhabited by approximately 128,610 residents and accounts for approximately 50 percent of the total population of Alachua County.

Public participation is a critical component in developing and implementing the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan. The Public Participation Plan spells out the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization's process for the general public and stakeholders to be involved in the regional transportation planning process. A successful Long-Range Transportation Plan considers socio-cultural, economic, public health and environmental impacts of the Gainesville transportation system on the region and beyond. The following Public Participation Plan offers goals, objectives, strategies and tools to maintain public input throughout the Long-Range Transportation Plan process from public officials, citizens and stakeholders. The Public Participation Plan was developed to keep the public informed and engaged by various means in providing feedback throughout the process of developing the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan.

Public Participation Requirements

Metropolitan planning organizations have many federal and state requirements for facilitating inclusive public participation. The Fixing America's Surface Transportation Act, Public Law 114-94, enacted in 2015, and prior legislation (Moving Ahead for Progress in the 21st Century Act, Public Law 112-141) outline requirements for metropolitan planning organizations to provide a forum for public participation in the transportation planning processes.

In accordance with Federal and State guidelines and requirements, this Public Participation Plan achieves the following targets:

- Defines a process for providing individuals, affected public agencies, representatives of public transportation employees, public ports, freight shippers, providers of freight transportation services, private providers of transportation (e.g. intercity bus operators, employer-based commuting programs, transit benefit programs, and telework programs), representatives of users of public transportation, pedestrian walkways and bicycle transportation facilities, the disabled, and other interested parties, with reasonable opportunities to be involved in developing the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan;
- Provides adequate public notice of public participation activities and time for public review and comment at key decision points, including a reasonable opportunity to comment on the proposed Long-Range Transportation Plan;
- Provides timely notice and reasonable access to information about transportation issues and processes;
- Employs visualization techniques to describe the proposed Long-Range Transportation Plan in public workshops, public hearings and meetings;
- Makes public information (technical information and meeting notices) available in electronically accessible formats and means, such as the Internet and through social media;
- Holds public meetings at convenient and Title VI-compliant accessible locations and times;
- Demonstrates explicit consideration and response to public input received in developing the Long-Range Transportation Plan;

- Seeks and considers the needs of those traditionally underserved and under-represented by existing transportation systems, such as persons of low-income and in minority households, who may face challenges accessing employment and other services;
- Consults with the statewide transportation planning public involvement and consultation processes; and periodically reviews the effectiveness of the public involvement procedures and strategies contained in the Public Participation Plan to ensure a full and open participation process; and
- Provides an additional opportunity for public comment, if the final Long-Range Transportation
 Plan differs significantly from the version that was made available for public comment by
 the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization and raises new material issues that
 interested parties could not reasonably have foreseen from the public involvement efforts.

Goals, Objectives, and Strategies

This Public Participation Plan was developed to ensure transparency and continuing participation by the Gainesville community in the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan development process. The purpose of the Plan is to implement inclusive participation by outlining opportunities for the public to participate in developing of the 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan. The following goals, objectives and strategies will be employed to achieve this purpose of this Plan. This Public Participation Plan is consistent with the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization public Involvement Plan.

Public Participation Goals

- **1. Inform and educate:** The Public Participation Plan shall offer reasonable access and opportunities to inform and educate the public of transportation issues and processes.
- 2. **Promote transparency:** The Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization shall uphold transparency throughout the planning process to instill public trust to engage in shaping policy and informing decisions.
- 3. Encourage broad and diverse participation: Public participation shall include the greatest number of people possible from the region surrounding and including the Gainesville Metropolitan Area and reflect the Gainesville Metropolitan Area's diverse population, regardless of individuals' language, personal mobility or ability to attend a meeting, subject to available budget and resources.
- **4. Value feedback:** The feedback received through this Public Participation Plan shall be reviewed and given to policy makers in a timely manner to inform their decisions. Interested participants should be informed of actions by the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization at key milestones throughout the planning process.

Stakeholder involvement will proceed on the basis of these goals with four (4) major objectives:

- 1. Survey public opinion
- 2. Coordinate with local boards and main institutions
- 3. Discuss and confirm proposed policies
- 4. Provide recommendations

Public Participation Objectives and Strategies

This section lists objectives and strategies to achieve the goals listed above.

Objective 1: Outreach and Engagement Options	Employ timely outreach opportunities through a variety of means, such as public workshops, informal meetings and surveys to inform, educate, create dialogue and elicit input from the public for the Gainesville Metropolitan Area 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan.
Objective 2: Diversity and Inclusivity	Include a diverse range of stakeholders and perspectives to gain an accurate reflection of views and inputs. While maintaining open channels for all parties to participate, engage groups in the process who may be impacted the most. Inclusivity shall emphasize listening and mutual respect and shall include a safe space to share ideas, creating equal opportunities for input without fear of intimidation or ridicule.
Objective 3: Accessibility	The public shall be provided equal and ample opportunities to participate in the planning process. This shall include scheduling sessions at various days and times throughout the day and selecting of venues/locations with ample access to public transportation, safe biking, and proximity to those with the greatest mobility challenges is offered.

Comment forms will be available at community presentations and other events. The public will be encouraged to share ideas, suggestions, issues and concerns about future transportation plans. A portion of each meeting shall be devoted to questions and answers and the public shall be asked to identify and provide information about transportation problem areas. A report will be prepared detailing public comments and responses.



All meetings will universally accommodate attendees by considering the following guidelines:

- Hosting at locations where the community regularly congregates;
- Scheduling at various times and dates;
- Hosting at locations in compliance with American with Disabilities Act requirements;
- Hosting at locations accessible by public transportation; and
- Posting proper signage along routes leading to meeting locations.

The community will be notified in advance of public meetings through:



Underserved/Under-involved Communities

Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 provides that: "no person in the United States shall, on the grounds of race, color, or national origin, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance. (42 U.S.C. 2000d-1)." Title VI provides the following protection and activities relative to public involvement:

- Encourages the participation of minorities as members of planning or advisory bodies for programs receiving Federal funds;
- Requires information and services to be provided in languages other than English when significant numbers of potential beneficiaries have limited English-speaking ability; and
- Requires entities to notify the entire eligible population about programs.

The Long-Range Transportation Plan update will include outreach to the elderly, persons with disabilities, minorities and those of low-income. Outreach will also include "environmental justice" populations, such as the transportation disadvantaged, transit-dependents, and other groups traditionally under-represented in the planning process. Outreach will be facilitated by posting flyers and/or posters for display on Regional Transit System buses, information kiosks and paratransit vehicles. Strategies to solicit input from the business, environmental and other communities of local significance, shall also be implemented.

Limited English Proficiency Populations

Federal Executive Order 13166, Improving Access to Services for Persons with Limited English Proficiency, requires agencies to develop plans to accommodate people for whom English is not their native language, or who have a limited ability to read, speak, write, or understand English. To comply, metropolitan planning organizations must develop and post a written Limited English Proficiency Plan that includes analysis of four factors:

- Demography: Number and/or proportion of persons with Limited English Proficiency served and languages spoken in service area;
- Frequency: Rate of contact with service or program;
- Importance: Nature and importance of program/service to people's lives; and
- Resources: Available resources, including language assistance services.

Final Report

COVID-19 Pandemic Addendum Public Participation Continuity of Operations

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, a State of Emergency declaration by the Governor has impacted public participation for the Year 2045 Long-Range Transportation Plan update process. The Governor issued an executive order that provided an exemption to in-person public meetings thereby authorizing metropolitan planning organizations to conduct virtual public meetings via communications media technology. To address disruption of normal operations, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization for the Gainesville Urbanized Area (Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization) activated its Continuity of Operations Plan. Soon after activation of the plan, on April 20, 2020, the Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization conducted a virtual public meeting and adopted three resolutions to facilitate administrative and public participation continuity of operations.

In order to address Title VI of the Civil Rights Act and Americans with Disabilities Act compliance, Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization staff will assist in the accommodation of requests by persons with disabilities for alternative formats of and/or assistance with public meeting notices, public meeting packets, planning documents and flyers. Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization Subcommittees and Advisory Committees - Whenever possible, Audit Committee, ad hoc appointed subcommittees, steering committees and working groups, Bicycle/Pedestrian Advisory Board, Citizens Advisory Committee and Technical Advisory Committee virtual public meetings, shall use audio conferencing and web-based webinar communications media technology that is accessible to the public. If available, web-based video communications media technology may be used.
